RULES & REGULATIONS

1. The Cottagers' area comprises the Parishes of Clutton, Temple Cloud, Cameley, Chelwood, High Littleton, and Hallatrow. The Executive Committee shall determine any argument on this matter.
2. The Open Classes are open to all, irrespective of residence.
3. The Silver Salver, Silver Cups and Bowls etc awarded will remain the property of the Society and winners must undertake to keep it/them in good condition whilst in his or her possession and return it/them one month before the next year's Show Day.

4. All entries **MUST** be received by the Show Organiser no later than 9 p.m. on Thursday 7th August. Entries may be made by post, online at www.cluttongardening.org or in person at the Showground on the Thursday (6.30p.m. to 9p.m.) before Show Day. Exhibitors' tickets will be available from the Show Secretary's Tent on Saturday morning. Subject to availability of space, **ADDITIONAL** entries may be made on Saturday between 7a.m. and 10a.m. at **DOUBLE ENTRY FEE** unless previous entries have been made by the exhibitor.

5. All exhibits are to be *bona fide* produce or work of the exhibitor and shall have been in their possession at least two months prior to the Show in relevant classes.
6. No exhibit should have been exhibited at a previous Clutton Show (except Bonsai).
7. The Committee reserve the right to inspect any gardens or exhibits either before or after the Show
8. No exhibit shall be removed until 5p.m. Trophy winners will be announced at 4.30p.m. No prize card shall be removed until 5p.m. Prize money can be claimed at any time after 4p.m.
9. The Committee, whilst taking every possible care of exhibits, will not be responsible for any loss or damage.
10. Any competitor breaking the rules shall be disqualified from taking any prize whatsoever.
11. All matters not provided for in these Rules shall be left to the discretion of the committee holding office, whose decision shall be final.
12. The Committee reserve the right to accept or decline any entry.
13. On the relative merits of the exhibits, the decision of the judges shall be final, but if the absolute merit of any exhibit in any class is such that it is not appropriate to award a particular or any prize, then this action will be taken.
14. Any protest must be made in writing accompanied by a fee of £2.00 and delivered to the Secretary within one hour of the opening of the Show to the public. The fee shall be returned in the event of such protest being upheld.
15. For the purpose of this Show a bowl is a vessel for displaying cut flowers in water or for growing bulbous plants and having a diameter at it's mouth at least equal to but usually greater than it's height. A vase is a vessel for displaying cut flowers in water and having a height greater than the diameter of its mouth.

16. It is important to note that the Committee reserve the right to move Staged Exhibits according to space requirements

NO PERSON OTHER THAN A COMMITTEE MEMBER OR AN OFFICIAL STEWARD MAY MOVE A STAGED EXHIBIT.

17. ALL EXHIBITS MUST BE STAGED AND EXHIBITORS MUST LEAVE THE MARQUEE BY 10.30A.M., WHEN JUDGING WILL COMMENCE

N.B. The marquees will be open for overnight storage of exhibits from 8 p.m. on Friday 8th August AT EXHIBITORS' SOLE RISK.

SC1 SPECIAL CLASS: A COLLECTION OF VEGETABLES

PRIZES £10 - £5 - £2 - Entry Fee £1

1. This Class is for three vegetable types chosen from the following eight. The quality of each vegetable to be included is shown in brackets.

CAULIFLOWERS (2)

ONIONS (3)

POTATOES (3)

PEAS (6)

RUNNER BEANS (6)

TOMATOES (6)

CARROTS (3)

PARSNIPS (3)

SHALLOTS (6)

For carrots and parsnips the top foliage should be trimmed to 3 inches from the top of the shoulder of the vegetable. Peas and beans have some stalk attached. Tomatoes to be displayed with calyces. Onion and shallot tops may be tied or whipped using raffia.

2. Judging per vegetable type is: 7 points for size, shape and colour, 7 points for condition, 6 points for uniformity.

3. The vegetables should be displayed within an area of 18in by 24in. All vegetables must be displayed within the confines of this area, and no part of any vegetable come out of it. A tray or board measuring 18in by 24in can be used by the exhibitor on which to display the vegetables, or the area can simply be marked out on the staging. Where a tray has a lip or edge, the internal measurements must not exceed 18in x 24in. Exhibits must not be bent to fit!

4. The only garnishing material allowed is parsley. A black bascloth is permitted, or the tray can be painted. No other material is allowed, e.g. plates, rings, sand etc.

5. This Class is open to all

SC2 SPECIAL CLASS: THE ROY COLLINS MEMORIAL CUP

PRIZES - £20 - £10 - £5 - Entry Fee £1

1. This Class is for a group of Pot Plants and/or Cut Flowers and foliage arranged for effect on table space 6' x 2'3"

2. Judging will be 25 points for colour, form, condition, quality and freshness of the displayed flowers, 10 points for overall presentation and effect of the plants/flowers.

3. This Class is open to all, including groups, societies, families, etc.

SHOW AWARDS

Trophies awarded at the Show must be afterwards handed to the Society for the necessary engraving to be undertaken, following which they will be presented at the Annual Presentation Evening on November 15th

A BANKSIAN MEDAL presented by the Royal Horticultural Society will be awarded to the competitor winning the highest total number of points in the Horticultural Classes of the Show (except Special Classes). A competitor may only win one of these medals every three years (2023 Neil Hatch 2024 Trevor Chubb)

THE SENIOR SERVICE SILVER SALVER will be awarded for the best horticultural exhibit in the Show.

THE CLUTTON PARISH COUNCIL CUP will be awarded to the Clutton resident who has never won a major award.

BOILED FRUIT CAKE

110g (4oz) margarine

110g (4oz) caster sugar

225g (8oz) self-raising flour

2 eggs

225g (8oz) dried fruit

Almond essence (optional)

Mixed spice to taste

¼tsp. bicarbonate of soda

150ml (6fl.oz) milk

In a saucepan melt together the milk, margarine and sugar with the bicarbonate of soda and the dried fruit. Keep warm for 15 minutes without actually boiling. Remove from the heat and allow to cool for about 15 minutes. Beat the eggs together and then whisk them into the warm mixture. Fold in the flour and flavourings. Turn into a greased **MAXIMUM 8in / 20cm** round cake tin and bake in the oven for 45-60 minutes. Electric 160 degrees. Gas mark 3.
